ADOPT NEW POLICY 5-19, PROMOTION AND TENURE, AND RESCIND CURRENT POLICY 5-02, FACULTY TENURE, EFFECTIVE JANUARY 24, 2013:

Dr. Cooley explained Academic Council has harmonized two policies and three procedures into one policy and one procedure in order to address organizational changes in the promotion and tenure process. Tenure and first promotion were once separate processes with varying portfolio requirements and timelines. Over time, the processes merged, and the revisions reflect the updated approach, our semester calendar, and address issues that have arisen during implementation. Faculty will now be able to immerse themselves in significant areas related to student success, diversity, enrollment, and make contributions in ways that they were not able to do before.

<u>Member Bowman moved</u>, Member Rosen seconded, the adoption of Policy 5-19, Promotion and Tenure and to rescind current Policy 5-02, Faculty Tenure, effective January 24, 2013, be approved as presented.

PRELIMINARY YEAR-END FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDING JUNE 30, 2015:

Ms. Gehr explained the projected year-end revenue and expenses have yielded additional net operational revenue of about \$2.0 million, due most notably to recent health care adjustments that are projected to yield \$800,000 in lower expenses. Coupled with projected interest income of approximately \$700,000, \$2.7 million is projected to be available for additional strategic allocations.

The College is requesting that the Board allocate \$500,000 to the Student Success and Innovation Fund. These funds would be used for the Diversity and Cultural Inclusion Initiative, and the Aligning and Communicating Strategic Priorities Action Project, which is an accreditation requirement. The balance would be used for capital improvements. A Capital Plan will be presented to the Board in the Fall.

These year-end financials are preliminary and not final until confirmed by our auditors. Ms. Gehr requested that the Board provide the President the allocation commiserate with the final audited numbers.

Commitment to Diversity and Inclusion

Dr. Harrison introduced Ms. Kimberly Brazwell as the Special Assistant to the President for Diversity Initiatives. Ms. Brazwell has more than 15 years of experience in educational administration, diversity and inclusion efforts, wellness advocacy and community building, including Manager of Diversity Initiatives and Study Abroad at Columbus State from 2007-2013. She most recently served at Bexley City Schools as its director of Student and Community Engagement, leading efforts to address non-academic barriers to student success.

West High School Credits Count Visit

West High School is the first Credit Counts high school for Columbus State. There was a year-end celebration held at Columbus State which connected their faculty with our faculty, a tour of Columbus State, and breakout sessions in many disciplines.

Mid-Ohio Foodbank Free Produce Market

Columbus State volunteers from eight departments distributed seven pallets of produce from the Mid-Ohio Foodbank to more than 300 Columbus State students and community members on campus.

Channel 10 - FastPath Program Offers Free Training to Columbus Residents in Growing Fields

Channel 10 ran a story on the FastPath Program at Columbus State. Nancy Case and her team are leading the FastPath Program which is a partnership with the City of Columbus to help those who are underemployed or trying to re-enter the workforce.

Textbook Affordability

Matt Heywood, Assistant Professor, Computer Science and Stacey Mulinex, Director, Bookstore presented Columbus State's initiatives to the Board of Regents' Efficiency Advisory Committee.

Updates

- OACC Chair Flowers, Trustee Lopez-Walton, and Dr. Harrison attended the Ohio Association of Community Colleges (OACC) annual meeting in Cleveland. The dues for OACC have been restructured due to the structural imbalance in the OACC budget. The increase will occur for the colleges over the next three years. The increase is tied to the existing distribution coupled with the distribution of the current SSI.
- Ohio College Access Network (OCAN) was a state funded agency for nine years with a focus on providing access services and an emphasis on urban and rural school districts. OCAN's state funding was eliminated and they have been supported the last couple of years with grants. Reggie Wilkerson, Executive Director of OCAN has been a strong supporter of the Central Ohio Compact and reached out to Columbus State regarding a partnership to help them determine if there is still a need for their services. Mr. Wilkerson is working with Steve Dackin on a draft of a Memorandum of Understanding, which may be in the form of a grant where Columbus State would provide office services and space for two or three staff members, while they figure out if the services are still needed. The Ohio Board of Regents is enthusiastic about Columbus State providing this aid to OCAN.

Public Policy

- Federal Dr. Harrison and Chair Flowers will be attending a convening at the White House on America's College Promise.
- State the colleges were able to secure legislation that builds the 2+2 framework into the state budget. The 2+2 legislation requires universities to accept the Associate Degree as a transfer credential.
- Local FutureReady Columbus is the result of a merger of three non-profits focused on education. Kids Ohio, and Learn for Life will be merged as a single entity and Learning Circles will keep its brand identity because they work outside our region. Learning Circles will be part of FutureReady Columbus as well. There is a five-member start up Board comprised of Mayor Coleman, George Barrett, CEO, Cardinal Health, Dan Good, Superintendent, Columbus City Schools, Commissioner Marilyn Brown, and Dr. Harrison.

Chair Flowers made the following comments on behalf of the entire Board with respect to the Board's annual evaluation of President Harrison performance:

In keeping with our past practice, The Columbus State Community College Board of Trustees has completed its annual evaluation of Dr. Harrison for the 2014-2015 academic and fiscal year.

The evaluation process is made easier by the fact that the performance goals for Dr. Harrison are not arbitrarily set by the Board, but are set after close consultation with Dr. Harrison. So in every way there is an identity of belief that the pursuit of these goals is the best way to advance Columbus State for the benefit of its students and for the benefit of the people of the State of Ohio who have entrusted us with the oversight of this great institution.

For 2014-2015, Dr. Harrison focused his efforts on the same three categories as last year, which are:

- 1. Achieving Student Success;
- 2. Enabling Capacity to Execute Mission with Excellence; and
- 3. Building Alliances with Regional Partners.

The Board noted with much satisfaction that during 2014-2015, in many instances, the work in these three areas moved from planning to implementation.

Allow me to share a few examples of the progress made in each category.

Key Student Success Accomplishments

- 1. **State Share of Instruction Funding**. With regard to three-year average for success points, the Board noted proudly that the College accumulated the second most points in Ohio.
- Piloted a new Orientation program. When compared to the control group, the
 orientation program demonstrated significant improvement in GPA, course
 completion and retention.

Key Capacity Accomplishments.

- 1. **Affordability**. Tackled the challenge of affordability by focusing on value added programs like College Credit Plus and our 2 plus 2/ Preferred Pathway programs.
- 2. New leaders. Attracted significant new and talented leaders to the college by completing successful searches for 2 new vice presidents and 3 new academic deans.

Key Partnership Accomplishments.

- Straight A Grant. Put Straight A Grant funds to work to build capacity in strategic areas such as the project with Marysville schools to establish an advanced manufacturing center and early college site.
- 2. **Credits count**. Deployed the funds from an AEP grant to successfully launch this program at West High School and prepared the way for the addition of Whetstone High School to the program in 2015-2016.

Dr. Harrison has done all of the above, while remaining a visible and effective spokesman for the college in this community, around the state and increasingly on the national stage.

On a personal level, his warm and welcoming demeanor make it a pleasure for us as trustees to work with him.

In summary, the Board is well pleased with the performance of Dr. Harrison and concludes that he has not only met, but exceeded the Board's expectations during this past academic year. Congratulations President Harrison.

Member Rosen moved, Member Hoover seconded, that based upon Dr. Harrison's exceptional performance, service and commitment, that the Columbus State Board of Trustees hereby extends the term of Dr. Harrison's existing contract by one year for a new end date of June 30, 2020; approves new performance goals also described in the contract as Attachment A that captures the President's performance goals for the 2015-2016 performance year; directs that the new Attachment replace the former attachment from the 2014-2015 performance year; and grants Dr. Harrison the salary increase authorized for administrators and staff effective July 1, 2015, and the full amount of all other compensation and benefits to which he is entitled under the contract.
