#### Member Dolan moved, Member Flowers seconded, that the Board of Trustees:

- (1) Adopt the revised Policy 5-15, Advisory Committees as proposed;
- (2) Adopt the new Performance Management Policy as presented to be effective June 1, 2008; and that the provisions of the new policy shall supersede and prevail in instances where there is a language conflict with any other existing policies and/or procedures.
- (3) Approve the following compensation adjustments as recommended below:

#### **Full-time employees:**

That the current staff and administrator salary ranges not be amended due to the implementation of the Performance Management Policy. The broad banding provisions of the Policy make it unnecessary to adjust ranges at this time.

That salary adjustments for individual employees be implemented only after a formal evaluation of each employee is performed by his/her supervisor which includes a professional development plan and recommendation for a salary increase, and that such evaluation and recommendation be filed with the Human Resource Department; and

The additional salary and benefit pool for the requested increases is \$2,184,748 from the General Fund and \$106,404 from the Auxiliary Fund.

That the pool of monies approved (3.75% percent) for staff and administrator salary adjustments (who are evaluated on a merit basis) be \$1,301,431 (annual basis); and

The above actions shall be effective with the pay period that begins July 1, 2008.

#### **Adjunct Faculty:**

Effective July 1, 2008 all adjunct faculty will be paid the flat rate of \$43.06 per contact hour and that the cost of implementation of this rate is approximately \$748,718.

#### **Part-time Employees:**

Effective July 1, 2008, all part-time employees will receive a 3.75% increase in the hourly wage rate. The cost to implement this recommendation is approximately \$241,003.

- (4) Approve Personnel Information items as presented.
- (5) Authorize the College to enter into contracts with the lowest responsive and responsible bidders as outlined below for each of the listed Construction Projects; as well as authorize all projects to be funded from the Capital Improvement and Land Acquisition account, State of Ohio Basic Renovations Funds, bond proceeds, and the CRAT maintenance fund with the pre-approval of the President, who will report to the Board of Trustees annually on the projects and amounts allocated:

#### **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**:

The president, reported on the following items:

#### Staff Employee of the Month

Richard James, Video Web Developer for Instructional Technologies, and Linda Reid, Office Associate for Career & Technical Programs and Accounting were selected as the Employee of the Month for April and May respectively.

#### Alpha Rho Epsilon Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa Named "Five Star Chapter."

Columbus State's chapter of Phi Theta Kappa was made a Five Star Chapter again this year and this commendation comes as a result of meeting the requirements of the society's Five Star Chapter Development Program.

#### Phi Theta Kappa Annual Convention

Connie Meyer, the Board's Ex-Officio Student, is completing her term as National Vice President for Phi Theta Kappa. This year, for the first time, ACC and PTK held their annual convention together recognizing students who have held an executive office in the organization, along with the presidents from their college. Dr. Moeller thanked Connie for her hard work with Phi Theta Kappa, and for her outstanding representation of the College.

#### CSCC Students Named to 2008 All-Ohio Academic Team

Columbus State had two students recognized at the All-Ohio Academic Team luncheon, Dawn Leach and Matthew Wolf. The luncheon was held at the Statehouse Atrium in April.

#### Michael Bowers Earns Small Business Award

Michael bowers, the director of the College's Small Business Development Center, was awarded the Small Business Development Center Service Excellence and Innovation Award in recognition of outstanding programs and service offered to the central Ohio small business community helping them with their plans for putting their businesses in place.

#### NLNAC Approves Continuing Accreditation of Nursing Program

The National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission has granted Columbus State's associate degree nursing program continuing accreditation until the year 2015.

The president brought to our attention the new pictures displayed in the Board Room which were the winning pictures from the Digital Arts Festival done by Columbus State students. Dr. Moeller explained that this year the number of entries doubled from previous years, as well as the number of attendees.

#### Histology Certificate Class Passes ASCP

The on-line Histology Certificate Program class had a 100% pass rate this year, which is significant in that in previous years, the pass rate has been as low as 0%. As a result, the College has been recommended for the full five-year accreditation.

#### Delaware Campus Update

Dr. Moeller advised that the Liberty Township Zoning Commission has approved the design for the building at the new Delaware Campus site. A groundbreaking ceremony is being scheduled for sometime in July, and invitations will be sent out shortly. She also gave an overview of the three winning projects selected from the Delaware Strategic Initiative competition.

#### Chancellor Outlines Plan to Reduce Textbook Costs

The Chancellor was on campus to talk about the cost of college text books. Over 300 attendees were present to hear the plan that will be put in place.

#### State News

The president gave an update on House Bill 554 and Senate Bill 335, the Ohio Innovation Partnership Co-op/Internship Program. She explained that, when the bill was first introduced, community colleges could not apply for these funds by themselves—a four-year institution would also have to sign on part of the grant. Now, we have an opportunity to apply alone, or in conjunction with other higher education institutions. A competitive process for receiving the funds will be established by the Chancellor, and he will encourage proposals that recruit Ohio residents enrolled in higher education institution outside of Ohio to return to Ohio to participate in co/op and internship programs.

#### National News

Dr. Moeller attended the Ohio Presidents Summit put together by Senator Sherrod Brown to discuss government assistance in accomplishing the plan for higher education in Ohio.

The Board was advised that the College is paying closer attention to student loans because of what has happened with the student loan regulations passed by Congress in terms of the interest rates. It was noted that having a low default rate has been in Columbus State's favor.

The president explained that the Senate and House have both passed their version of the Higher Education Act Reauthorization. There are an increasing number of reporting and regulatory items in both version to the tune of over 200 in the House and 160 in the Senate. This causes an increase in the need for additional staff, equipment, etc., which makes for in imbalance between the reporting costs and tuition fees.

There has been great concern over the way colleges are accredited. There are six governing bodies at this point in time. There have been discussions as to whether there should be just one governing body to eliminate confusion.

Other discussions centered on consumer information. What is communicated by some institutions is not communicated by others. This has promoted a movement to encourage all institutions to communicate the same information in order to give a clearer picture of each.

There were also discussions regarding truth in tuition and its effects.

An expansion of the GI Bill has passed in the Senate allowing for additional dollars to the program. This will have certain implications for the us in that, veterans will be allowed funds to attend the most expensive college in their state plus monthly stipends for housing costs if this passed into law.

The president advised that, a Columbus State student, Michele Welsh, retired last week for the Ohio Air National Guard and was awarded the Meritorious Service Award for her outstanding career. She served her country for 20 years.

Dr. Kay Adkins, Provost, gave an overview of the programs and services associated with the Community Education and Workforce Development division of the College, as well as some of the history behind the various programs. Dr. Moeller introduced Cheryl Hay, Rita Bedritis and Nancy Case, staff members for some of the workforce programs mentioned.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

#### **OACC Board Delegates**

The Ohio Association of Community Colleges (OACC) is the statewide organization composed of the presidents and trustees of Ohio's 23 two-year colleges. Voting members consist of one president and one trustee from each institution. The Board was asked to elect one of its trustees to serve as Columbus State's delegate, as well an alternate to represent the College.

<u>Member Keller moved</u>, Member Owens seconded, that Trustee Priscilla Mead be reelected as Columbus State's delegate to the Ohio Association of Community Colleges, and Trustee Debra Plousha Moore serve as the alternate.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

#### **Strategic Goals**

Trustee Keller gave an update on the Strategic Goals for the College. He explained that the five Strategic Goals that culminated from the Board Retreat in May were:

- (1) Access a 3% enrollment increase, as well as specific goals for the Delaware campus, and basic certificate training;
- (2) Student success increasing the graduation rate, student retention, and GPA;
- (3) Human capacity development getting all of the non-union employees into the new broad banding program and having a performance/development plan in place;
- (4) Sustainability focusing on financial and energy efficiencies;
- (5) Academic quality improvements AQIP accreditation and process improvements.

He explained that he is excited about the College's effort to build a roadmap and SMART objectives for each year. The goal is to have all of the strategic goals completed by the July Board meeting.

#### **Scholarship Fund**

The president explained that the Committee of the Whole discussed setting up a scholarship fund for older adult students who want to attend college but don't have the means. The Board was asked to approve \$1 million per year for the next three years for scholarships to students who are 25 years of age or older or who have not attended college for at least one year.

Member Mead moved, Member Plousha Moor seconded, that \$1 million per year be allocated for the next three years devoted to a scholarship fund program for adult students 25 years of age or older who want to enroll in college.





- (3) Lab fee revenue and expenses were previously budgeted and reported in Education and General expenditures, exactly offsetting each other. In response to Oct 2006 management letter comment, revenues and expenditures are budgeted and reported
- in "revenues" and "expenditures," with each accounting for a respective \$2.1 million increase, offsetting each other in the bottom line.

  (4) Interest Income is not in operating budget as a revenue source as per Resource Planning Guidelines approved by the Board in November 2007.
- (5) Includes 6 new faculty positions and 16 new staff positions, previously approved by the Board in November 2007 and March 2008, respectively.
- (6) General includes Planning & Construction, Human Resources, Office Services, Institutional Adv., KRP, Diversity & Inclusion, and Development Office.

# FY 09 PROPOSED OPERATING BUDGET REVENUES May, 2008










\* Revenues includes both grant and tuition fee income






